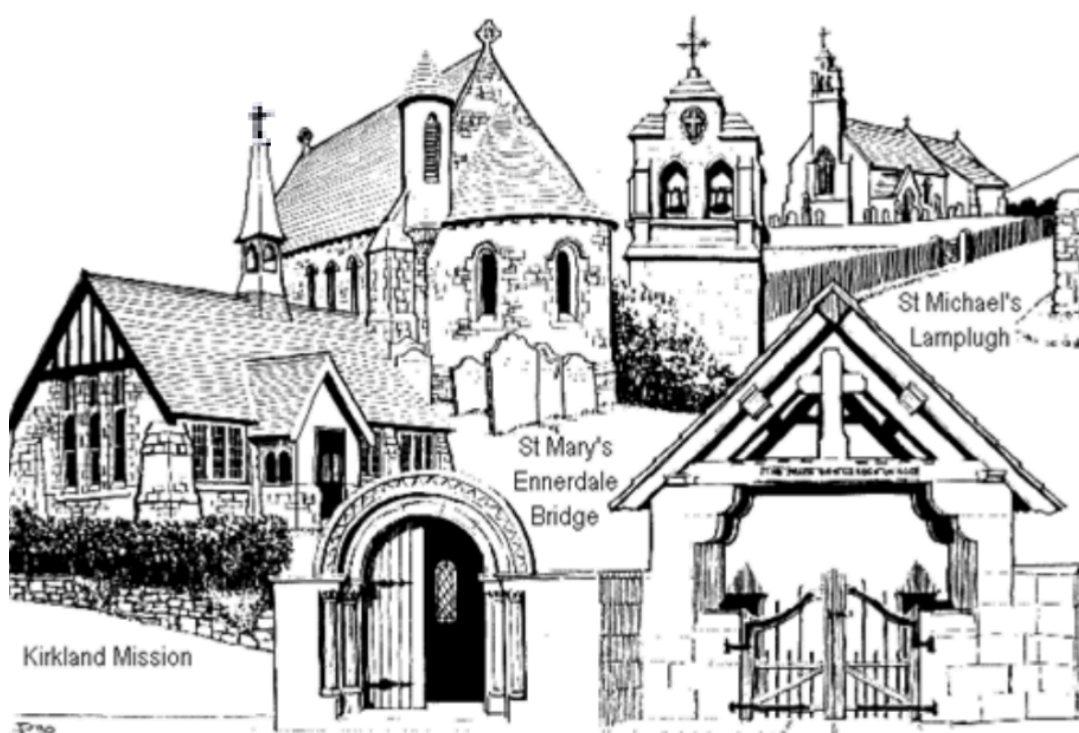

Minister's Letter

I expect that in the wake of the terrible earthquake in Burma / Myanmar most of us donated to the Disasters Emergency Committee appeal. Or maybe we donated through one of the 15 Charities that make up the committee. Christian Aid is a member of the DEC, and through its partnership with organisations already working in the country was able to send assistance very quickly.

Christian Aid Week (11th - 17th May) is approaching, and in this magazine you should find a Christian Aid envelope. Christian Aid is about much more than disaster relief, vital though that work is. Through their partner organisations overseas they have many projects that empower women, provide education, and encourage resilient and sustainable agriculture which is so necessary as climate change renders many traditional farming practices unviable in the nations most affected.

The work of Christian Aid overseas is this year even more vital, now that much of the UK Aid budget is being spent on asylum seekers who have manage to reach this country, and America, for so long the leading provider of Aid around the world, is retreating from this role as President Trump takes his hatchet to the USAID department.

So please put what you can afford, cash or cheque payable to Christian Aid, into the envelope and return it, either via a neighbour who attends church or by leaving it in church. Thank you very much.

Before we reach Christian Aid Week, it will be **May 8th** which is the **80th Anniversary of VE day** – the end of the Second World War in Europe. I am not aware of any events in the Parish to mark the day, but our Mission Community is inviting everyone to light a candle at 9.30 p.m. and say a prayer. I shall be distributing candles at both services on Sunday May 4th. Three prayers are available on the Church of England website; here is one of them:

For the peace of the world

O God, who would fold both heaven and earth in a single peace,
that the design of your great love lighten upon the waste of our wraths and sorrows,
give peace to your church, peace among nations,
peace in our dwellings and peace in our hearts;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

If you want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me - Matthew 16 : 24

Church attendance is continuing to decline across the country, right? WRONG!! at least according to a recent survey of church attendance in England and Wales by YouGov, commissioned by the Bible Society, and published with the title “The Quiet Revival”.

Over the last 6 years, church attendance has actually risen by 50%, with the most striking increase among young adults. In 2018, just 4% of 18–24-year-olds said that they attended church at least monthly. Today, says The Quiet Revival, this has risen to 16%, with young men increasing from 4% to 21%, and young women from 3% to 12%. Other findings are that men (13%) are more likely to attend church than women (10%). And as well as church decline being reversed, the Church is also becoming more ethnically diverse, with one in five people (19%) coming from an ethnic minority. Close to half of young Black people aged 18–34 (47%) are now attending church at least monthly, according to The Quiet Revival.

Church attendance in this parish has not increased in the last six years, so what is going on? The first thing to be said is that recorded Sunday attendance in traditional denominations like the Church of England and the Methodist Church has not shown an overall increase (though congregations in Church of England cathedrals have been increasing). The second thing is that people under 45 (the age groups which have all shown an increase) are much more likely to attend independent and Pentecostal churches in towns where the worship is based on upbeat contemporary music, and the congregation is not burdened with a crumbling ancient building. Finally, The Quiet Revival is based on what people say in answer to survey questions, not their actual behaviour. But it is encouraging that many more young people are claiming to attend church at least once a month than six years ago.

GOING GREEN GRACEFULLY No. 48

For Peat's Sake!

As Spring steadily gives way to Summer, those readers with green fingers will already be getting their borders, tubs and window boxes ready for those colourful annuals, flowers that brighten the garden and your lives, as well as for their edible garden produce. But what's the best medium to grow them in before they're ready to be planted out? This is a vexing question for someone who's keen to ensure that their love of growing flowers, veg, fruit, etc. doesn't have a negative impact on their environment.

Once upon a time, the go-to product was **peat** – that's the organic medium that's dug out of the ground in areas of peat bog. In the past it was dried and used as fuel, but it's likely that many readers will be aware of the rapidly diminishing amount of bog habitat in Britain, and what a special environment it is, home to many unique damp-loving species. Peat seems an ideal substrate for sowing seeds and growing on young plants – it retains water and, with the addition of fertilizers (as it's a sterile environment) it provides nutrients – but there's a problem here. As Emma Hinchcliffe of IUCN says, "*Peat belongs in bogs, not bags!*"

As recently as 2021 it was estimated that around 1 million cubic meters of peat was still being used in gardening products. So, what's the problem? Well, apart from its continued use having a massive negative impact on biodiversity, simply digging peat out of the ground, and drying it out for gardening use, releases tonnes of carbon dioxide into the air, loading our carbon footprint.

So, what are the alternatives? Well, one alternative is compost based on wood fibre or bark, with added inorganic material – bags of such **peat-free compost** are available in different grades (according to your planting needs) at most garden centres. Of course, the DIY solution is great: you can use a **composter** for your own garden and/or kitchen waste, allowing it to break down into a lovely natural organic compost, perfect for your young plants. **Cumberland CC** offers such composters through its partnership with **Great Green Systems** (<https://greatgreensystems.com/>).

Whatever your choice, enjoy some time out in the garden, tending those young plants and watching your garden produce develop in a peat-free environment.

Honey and Lemon Friendship Cookies

Suggested by Mary Johnson

Butter (softened) - 115g
Sugar - 85g
Runny Honey - 60g
Yolk of one egg
Self-raising Flour - 170g
Mixed Spice - half a teaspoon
Grated zest of half a Lemon
Pinch of salt
Dusting of Caster Sugar

1. Pre-heat oven to 180°C / 160°C fan oven / Gas mark 4 / 350°F
2. Grease two baking sheets
3. Cream the butter and sugar
4. Add the honey and egg yolk and mix again
5. Add flour, spices, grated lemon zest and salt and mix well again until all ingredients are combined
6. Place walnut-sized balls of the mixture onto the baking sheets, spaced well enough apart to allow for the cookies to spread
7. Bake for 12 - 15 minutes, or until golden brown
8. Remove from the oven, place on a wire rack, dust with a light coat of caster sugar and allow to cool.

King Dunmail

Chris Abbot writes:

On the A591 between Keswick and Grasmere, after passing Thirlmere Reservoir, there is a short section of dual carriageway going over the pass between Seat Sandal and Steel Fell. As it drops down towards Grasmere the road divides around a tall pile of stones - blink and you'll miss it!

This "pile of stones" is the cairn that gives the pass its name - "Dunmail Raise". This mountain pass forms part of the only low-level route through the mountains between the northern and southern sides of the Lake District.

"Raise" is an old name for a cairn, a construction which has been "raised up" by depositing stones. It seems to have marked an old boundary between Westmorland and Cumberland, and might have also marked the southern territorial extent of the medieval Kingdom of Strathclyde.



According to local legend, Dunmail, king of Cumbria, was attacked by the combined forces of Edmund and Malcolm and retreated into the heart of the Lake District. Dunmail met the kings in battle in the pass that divides Grasmere from Thirlmere but was killed in the fight (it is said at the hands of Edmund himself). It is claimed that survivors of the battle took Dunmail's crown and threw it into the depths of Grisedale Tarn to be safe until some future time when Dunmail would come again to lead them. Every year the spirits of the warriors are said to return to the tarn, recover the crown and carry it down to the cairn on Dunmail Raise. There they strike the cairn with their spears and a voice is heard from deep inside the stones, saying "Not yet, not yet; wait awhile, my warriors."

The story was versified by William Wordsworth in Canto First of 'The Waggoner', ll. 209-14; composed 1805, published 1819.

*They now have reach'd that pile of stones
Heap'd over brave king Dunmail's bones, —
He who once held supreme command,
Last king of rocky Cumberland.
His bones and those of all his power,
Slain here in a disastrous hour.*

Past Times

The enclosed report from a recent Keswick Reminder (Friday, 28th March 2025; p7) will interest your readers. It is from the (defunct) predecessor of The Reminder, called "English Lakes, Visitor and Keswick Guardian" from March 1900 and kept at Keswick Museum.

The report relates to Robert McCready, a quarryman at Honister and a native of Kirkland, near Frizington, who was 28 and a bachelor, and was found frozen to death in the snow near Buttermere after a night out on Saturday, 3rd February 1900. He lost his path.

FOUND DEAD IN THE SNOW AT BUTTERMERE

The body of Mr Robert McCready, a single man 28 years of age, a native of Kirkland, Frizington, who has been missing since Saturday night, the 3rd of February, was found on Wednesday in the hollow at the foot of the hill 300 yards from Buttermere and 100 yards from the road. The sad discovery was made by a shepherd named Edmondson while he was looking for lost sheep. Until a day or two ago the ground was still covered with snow which fell on Thursday, 1st of February. On Saturday McCready, who was working at the quarries at Honister, came down from Honister to Buttermere with two companions. They had had a little drink when they set out to return to Honister but the deceased's companions soon turned back on account of the difficulty in finding their way through the snow. McCready, however, persisted in going on, and he was never seen alive again.

The body was found near the road leading by way of Ennerdale to Frizington, and it is supposed that he either strayed from the proper footpath to Honister, or intended to attempt to reach his home

at Frizington, a distance of 13 miles. The inquest was held on Thursday afternoon at Buttermere Hotel by Mr John Simpson, Deputy Coroner, when a verdict of "Found Dead" was returned.

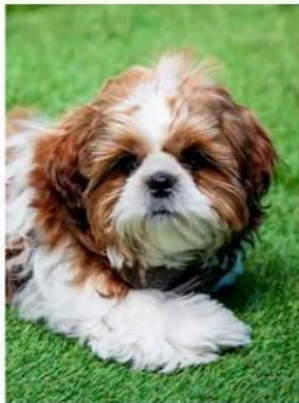
