Minister's Letter

If you hail from a city which is fortunate in having two Premier League football teams, you will be aware that at the time of the local Derby everyone is expected to owe allegiance to one or other of the teams. Support for one automatically rules out support for the other. In recent weeks we have heard about huge pro Palestinian demonstrations in London, which have made Jewish people feel afraid. Demonstrations of concern about terrorist acts in this country and illegal immigration have been experienced as hostile by Muslims among others. There has been a rise in the number of recorded antisemitic and Islamophobic incidents. If you only watched the news, you might be forgiven for thinking that the whole country has been polarised over the last two years since conflict erupted in the area which used to be called "the Holy Land" and everyone is expected to be on one side or the other. However, the situation in the country is far more complicated than in a city with two high profile football teams.

I recently spent a weekend in the company of a group of people who are either peace activists themselves or know people who are. The first thing I learned was that there are a lot of peaceful protests happening outside the main cities which never get reported on because no one feels afraid. One person had been part of a group which regularly held a noisy protest, banging her saucepan for peace on the Isle of Mull in Scotland. I don't think the Police Scotland has needed to take any action.

Until a few months ago, I didn't think that the Middle East conflict had had any impact in West Cumbria. Then I discovered that a group of Quakers have been holding a silent vigil on the main street in Cockermouth for a few hours nearly every Friday since the conflict began. Local media report antisocial behaviour by young people in Egremont, Cleator Moor and elsewhere, but they don't report pro peace



activity, even when it is sustained over many months. Almost everyone at my meeting had a story of what was going on in their neighbourhood, protesting against war, destruction and human suffering, but without being aligned with one "side" or the other.

Even the large scale demonstrations in London seem to be reported in black and white terms to suit a journalistic headline, rather than doing justice to the complexity of the activity. One

person at the meeting is on the streets of London nearly every Saturday photographing protests. He told us that on nearly every pro Palestinian march there are Jewish groups with their banners. They must feel constrained by their faith to support the people of Gaza in their extreme suffering, and cannot find the atmosphere antisemitic. Clearly they do not entirely agree with the narrative put forward by the current government of the state of Israel. (Obviously, there are other Jewish groups in this country who would take a different view from those who participate in the pro Palestinian demonstrations.)

It is the task of the Christian church to be concerned about all human suffering, and to be on the side of peace with justice. There have been many carefully crafted statements by church leaders to this effect, but they don't seem to attract much attention in the media either. This month many of us will wear our poppies and remember British service men and women who paid the ultimate price. May we also remember current conflicts, and continue to pray for peace.

A MAN'S BEST FRIEND IS A?

Their loyalty, affection and devotion are second to none and they become valued members of our family. We love the eyes of them and their expression, the warmly wagging tail and cold damp nose. Some owners sign their names on greeting cards and name them in their will.

There are over 800 breeds of them, each with their own unique personalities and features, and are known as a man's or woman's best friend. They are of course our DOGS!

Think of the height of the great Dane or Irish Wolfhound, also the speed of the Greyhound running up to 45 miles an hour, or the intelligence of the Scottish Border Collie (and the Afghan's lack of it!) The Bloodhound has the ability to distinguish several scents some days old. A dog's sense of smell is 1,000 times more than humans and who says they can't communicate? We know when they say "I want a walk" or "I Want you to play with me" or "Someone is at the door".

They have a shortish life and on average live about 15 years. They have achieved amazing things and played a vital role in both World War 1 and World War 2. This month is significant as we think about those that lost their lives during those conflicts, and the 53,000 dogs that served beside them. They were trained by the British Dogs School who prepared them for the battlefield.

In World War 1 different breeds of dog were used, such as great Danes ,Mastiffs, St Bernhards, Newfoundland, Dalmatians, Collies, Airedales and crossbred sheep dogs. They were extensively used for critical roles including message delivery, finding wounded soldiers, guarding, detecting gas and acting as mascots for troops. They sniffed out enemy lines, tracked, caught pests and provided comfort and companionship to the soldiers. It is estimated that 30,000 dogs were mainly used as messengers and ambulance dogs and they too lost their lives. In World War 2 different breeds of dogs were used, such as Pinschers, German Shepherds, Doberman, and Labradors, who were commonly used. Military working dogs continue to serve today detecting explosives, weapons, mine detection, drugs and defending military personnel and property.

3 - Walter de la Mare

This month I am featuring two short poems from Walter de la Mare, or at least I think that I am. The first poem is definitely his, and I'm fairly sure that the second one is too, but its origin is a little more obscure. His poetry is known for romantic imagination, and the use of often simple and plain language. Let's kick off with Wanderers...not to be confused with the old English poem The Wanderer.

Wanderers

Wide are the meadows of night, And daisies are shining there, Tossing their lovely dews, Lustrous and fair;

And through these sweet fields go, Wanderers amid the stars -Venus, Mercury, Uranus, Neptune, Saturn, Jupiter, Mars.

'Tired in their silver, they move,
And circling, whisper and say,
Fair are the blossoming meads of delight
Through which we stray.

As we read, we can soon glean from the first stanza, metaphors being used for the night sky and planets of our solar system, sparkling above us. Indeed, they are explicitly named in the second stanza, leaving no doubt as to who the wanderers are.

Note though, in the third stanza, the word "Tired, written as an abbreviated form of 'Attired' - remember how poets can be devious, and do things deliberately to try and trick the reader. In this case, both 'tired' and 'attired' give valid but different meanings - a slow exhausted movement or indeed dressed very smartly!

My second poem stems from a childhood memory of it being read by my primary school teacher, Mr Nicholson at Montreal School, Cleator Moor, circa 1970. I have a very clear recollection of the first two lines, and that it was read aloud to the class on bonfire night, the 5th of November. Some subsequent research revealed that it too was probably written by Walter de la Mare, hence including it here.

Please to Remember

Here am I, a poor old guy, Legs in the bonfire, head in the sky, Shoeless my toes, wild stars behind, Smoke in my nose, and my eye-peeps blind;

Old hat, old straw - in this disgrace; While a wildfire gleams on a mask for face. Ay, all I am made of only trash is And soon - soon, will be dust and ashes.

Both poems have four lines per stanza, however they have different rhyme patterns. Looking at the last word of each line, Wanderers has an ABCB pattern, whereas Please to Remember, being aimed at children, has simpler and easier to remember form AABB.

The first thought for the second poem, is that it relates to an effigy of Guy Fawkes, sitting on top of the bonfire awaiting to be consumed by flames, in what was once a common place event across the county, and unvaryingly celebrated on the 5th of the November.

Now take a second look, and a possible second meaning can surface - poor old guy might be referring to an old man, who has failing eyesight and is so poor that he has no shoes. He is in the latter stages of life, sitting in an armchair, gazing at the heavens. He is contemplating his long life being spent, and that in the not-too-distant future, his mortal remains will be processed by cremation.

A Farmer's Observations

Aye, back end is aboot on us. Winter approaches.

The fields are strewn with fallen leaves and grass growth has slowed right down. We have lots of trees on the farm, of pretty much all the native species.

It's so sad to see many of the Ash trees that I climbed up and swung from as a kid just standing like grey, spikey, skeletons. They have succumbed to the Ash dieback fungus and have, either, had only sparse foliage, or no foliage at all, throughout the summer. I suppose they will become a habitat for insects and provide a food source for creatures further up the food chain, the woodpeckers are enjoying them.

Thankfully some of the Ash trees still seem to be healthy, hopefully they can tolerate the fungus and will survive. Many of the trees on our place are hundreds of years old and are very much part of the landscape.

On the other hand the Oak trees have produced a bumper crop of acorns, which the squirrels and Jays have been busy carrying off for winter provisions. The Jays tend to bury loads of acorns but forget where they have put them all, accidentally transplanting seeds. Whilst the acorns provide nibbles for the wild guys, they are actually toxic to both cattle and sheep. We have to be careful and keep the livestock away from them, otherwise, they could become dead stock. It is something to do with their complicated digestive system and the tannins.

Although we don't have any nowadays, it was common practice to let pigs forage for acorns, referred to as "pannage". Pigs can process and digest them, no problem. Some of the parish farms have registered rights of pannage on Kinniside common. I don't know if they affect the wild deer, but they probably will.

The cattle are in the buildings now and the daily routine starts with feeding and mucking out. We use the hay and silage, "fodder", made during the summer, to feed them over the winter months, until the grass gets going again in late spring. The calves also receive a bit of cereal based, ration "cake". We buy this in to provide them with a bit of extra energy and protein. They are still growing and need a little bit of help.

The manure "muck" that we clean from the concrete every day is stored for spreading on the fields, when conditions allow, to encourage grass growth in spring. The younger cattle are

bedded on straw, which we buy in. The contaminated bedding is kept in "middens", effectively big compost heaps, for at least a year. This allows the bacteria and fungus to do their stuff and adds to the nutrient value and soil conditioning quality of the soiled bedding. This over year muck is spread throughout the summer, to help grow the hay and silage for the winter, all part of a natural cycle.

The sheep have all been dipped to remove the summer parasites. There have been a lot of ticks this year due to the hot dry summer. The dip also protects them against the winter parasites, lice and scab mites. The chemical bonds to the wool grease, lanolin, in the sheep's fleece and provides a reservoir of insecticide.

Did you know that the lanolin, used in cosmetics, came from wool? Maybe this is why all the local farmers and shepherds have such a lovely complexion!!!

In order to treat the sheep that live on the fells, we have to gather them down to the farm yards. We use the dogs for this job and we couldn't farm without them. The Lakeland sheepdogs come in all shapes, sizes and colours and just love to work. They must be the most intelligent of dogs, doing much of the job instinctively and they are incredibly faithful. They happily work all day, for a pat on the head and a bowl of biscuits. Then are standing at the kennel door, the next morning, ready to do it all again. Some of my best friends have been dogs! Having just sung their praises, some of them do have their moments. You might have heard me trying to persuade them to do what I want, using fluent Anglo Saxon.

October is also the time of year when we sell many of the lambs. Born in spring and weaned from their mums last month, they have been sold on to other farmers to feed them over the winter ready for the butchers. The female "gimmer lambs" retained for breeding go away to a lowland farm for the winter. Like the calves they need a bit of help until they mature. They return to the fells in April, taking their place in the heafted flocks. We sell some of the older ewes, at this time of year as well. They go down into the lowlands and will continue to produce lambs for three or four years. Many of our Herdwicks found their way to Devon. They can manage in old age, on better grass. The back end sales are the return on a year's efforts and provide us with most of our income.

Everything I describe above has been going on, pretty much unchanged, for centuries. Maybe tractors have replaced horses and quad bikes allow us to get around quicker, but we can only do what the landscape allows. Nature will always prevail and we just work alongside it.

Tup time next month, the most important part of the sheep farming year.

It's gitten dark, a's garn to light t' fire.





Robin Megan writes:

The Parochial Church Council is very grateful for generous donations received from **Lamplugh Parish Council** (£2,500) and from **Cumberland Council** (£2,830) for essential repairs to the toilet block built and managed by **St. Michael's Church** for the use of the local community and the public in general. The toilet door was becoming increasingly in need of replacement due to wind damage and work is also required to the interior of the block.

Ironically due to further damage caused by the recent Storm Amy to the door, the facility has had to be closed until the repairs are undertaken (especially to the door!) and we regret the necessity for doing this and the inconvenience caused. However the donations will ensure that the repairs can take place sooner than expected and the toilet can be reopened for all to use once more.



Visitors to and residents of Ennerdale Bridge who use the Cold Fell road on their journey to Scarny Brow or towards Cleator Moor will pass a small structure, barely visible in the greenery of the photos, sitting slightly away from the road and facing towards the entrance

to The Old Vicarage. This is the "Winston Churchill Memorial Bus

Shelter"!

While regular bus services are a long distant memory for the residents here, this concrete structure remains, providing shelter to passing Coast to Coast walkers if they need a break stop before entering or after leaving the village.


