Minister's Letter

Many people in our parish seem to take holidays in September. So it was that the best sermon preached at Kirkland Mission this year was addressed to one of the smallest congregations of the year. On Sunday 21st of September the service was led by Rev. Nick Baker, Methodist Deputy Superintendent. He reminded us that we were in creation time (which runs from the 1st September to 4th October). The Bible readings for the day were about people being held accountable for their actions. He reminded us that Kirkland Mission has been a bronze award Eco church for quite some time, and asked us to imagine we had been visited by the children from our local primary school. He pointed out that children often ask the most pointed questions, and suggested they might ask why we had not gone on to get the silver award? He said we were accountable for the way we treated the natural environment. He had gone online to check his environmental footprint, and had discovered that if everyone on Earth wanted to consume as much as he did, it would require the produce of more than three planets to sustain us. He then did the survey again, pretending to be a vegan who went everywhere by public transport. Even then, that standard of living would still require two planets to sustain it, and of course there is only one planet Earth.

Creation time is an opportunity to challenge ourselves to walk more lightly on this earth, and increase our efforts to care for the natural world we have inherited. As we move from September into October, our focus changes from creation to harvest.

Historically, *Harvest Festival* was a celebration that "all was safely gathered in," and that there was enough food laid by to see folk through the winter and into the spring. Nowadays, we give thanks for our food and all the people involved in bringing it to us 'from farm to fork' by making an offering to help the less fortunate. We are asked to bring tinned or dry goods which can be donated to our local food bank. Their *Harvest Appeal* (see poster) indicates the products which they are particularly appealing for this year. The food bank appeal addresses needs close at hand, while our financial appeal helps people overseas. This is the second year when we have supported the **Tap Twinning** scheme initiated by *Christian Engineers for Development*. You can read more about CED elsewhere in the magazine. You will also find elsewhere the details of our Harvest services, and our *Harvest Supper*. The collection at the services will go to support this worthy cause, as well the profits from the *Harvest Supper*. Both of these actions will make a difference. It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness.

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Status

We are all conscious of what it means to have status and it can become very important to us. Jesus understood this and in Luke chapter 1 verses 7-14 he indicates where we should stand in a world where status defines worth and refines it into something radically different, calling it a table shaped by humility, grace and welcome.

Jesus does something very ordinary quite regularly throughout his ministry by sharing a meal. But as often happens when he is at the table things happen! At the wedding in Cana where he was a guest they ran out of the best wine. So he changed the water into an even greater wine that the guests had never tasted before.

In those days guests chose the place where they wanted to sit. Jesus was fascinated by this watching them carefully choose the best seats and the places of honour. Jesus then turns the whole idea of honour and status on its head by challenging his listeners at the table to take a bottom seat and let someone else take their place. He then goes further by saying that when you are the host don't just invite the people who can repay you the compliment like your family, friends or wealthy neighbours. Invite the poor, the homeless and the forgotten.

This message reminds us that the heart of the matter is not about climbing to the top of the ladder or surrounding ourselves with people like us. It is about opening our lives to those who are often left out and making room where others would close the door.

Jesus is not against honour, but he redefines it. Honour does not come from recognition or power he says but living out God's justice and love. God's kind of honour is quiet, generous and unselfish and it lifts others up. When we stop grasping for the best seat we are free to honour others without being noticed ourselves.

2 - Norman Nicholson

This month I will be reviewing a poem from Norman Cornthwaite Nicholson, of 14 St George's Terrace, Millom. Norman spent his whole life living in the same house (work ongoing to turn it into a museum), with the exception of about two years where he stayed, during a period of illness, in a sanatorium in the New Forest, Hampshire. Born and bred in Millom, and he was probably the most influential Cumbrian poet since William Wordsworth (see a future episode of Poetic Licence). Norman's poems tended to be focussed on the edgelands of Cumbria and its industrial past, in particular mining and iron production.

My chosen poem is The Whisperer, which was inspired by recovering from tuberculosis of the larynx, during which time he was unable to speak. As this is rather a long poem, I will present some excerpts in order to maintain the flavour, but still enable an appreciation of the whole poem.

The Whisperer

For twenty months I whispered, Spoke aloud Not a word, Except when the doctor, checking my chest, said: 'Say Ninety-nine.' And, from the mine Of my throat, hauling up my voice like a load of metal, I Said 'Ninety-nine.' From sixteen-Years-old to my eighteenth birthday I whispered clock And season round: Made no sound More than the wind that entered without knocking Through the door That wasn't there Or the slid-wide window that un-shuttered half the wall of my

> Day after day My larynx lay In dry dock until whispering seemed The normal way Of speaking: I

Shepherd's bothy Of a chalet.

Was surprised at the surprise on the face of strangers
Who wondered why
I was so shy.

I stump, stamp, blow
Whistle over and over, staring into the rowdy air, seeking
You or you,
Anyone who
Can lip-read the words of my whisper as clear as the clang of a
bell,
Can see me say:
'Wait! Wait!
Come closer;
I've something to tell.'

There are no hard and fast rules in poetry, and despite first appearances, poets usually write something a certain way quite deliberately, and for good reason. We often read poems that are written in neat stanzas but here, this has been written as rather long, even awkward sentences. Norman has carefully written like this, notice the way that the punctuation appears, and the way rhymes can be at the end of a line, or even part way through a line (internal rhymes). You can read it by pausing at each line end, or indeed by pausing where the punctuation lies - and by doing so the poem conveys a slightly different message.

This particular poem means so much to me, as a little while ago I had an issue with my larynx, and I too was unable to speak for some time. When my voice did begin to come back it was painful to talk, and even then only very quietly. I found it very frustrating that I could not talk or communicate effectively. I did get my own back though, as I found a phone app which converted my writing into audible words. I have to say that I did derive a little devilish pleasure from that, as I managed to share my frustration, by passing it onto others who had to listen to the irritating disembodied voice!

Summary of the September 2025 Lamplugh PC meeting Full minutes are posted on the Parish Council Notice Boards, if you want more details.

Public Participation Slot:

- Three members of the public attended the meeting.
- Cllr Braithwaite introduced the members of the parish council and gave an overview of the roles of the parish council.
- All three members of the public were observing only.

Received correspondence was reviewed:

- An email that was received about difficulties with LPG fuel deliveries, this was noted and councillors agreed this could be a concern in the future. The resident had also contacted MP Josh MacAllister.
- An email was received from the village hall committee looking for new committee members and volunteers, these were noted, however, no one was available at present.
- An email was received from a resident about fast food litter on the roads and the danger for dogs. It was noted that the resident had also reported this to Cumberland Council and a fast food establishment, the parish council were unable to do anything further, but it had been noted.
- Two Fibrus Intention to Site emails had been received for telegraph pole installation at Burn Bank near Greensyke and The Old Post Office, these were both noted.
- An email and slideshow regarding Planning in Lake District Session 2 was received and passed to councillors for their attention.

Financial Matters:

To note the balance held in the building society confirmed with statement as below:

- **Statement No. 92** dated 31st July 2025 start balance £23,652.10, end balance £23,280; money in £1,215.24, money out £1,5877.07.
- **Statement No. 93** dated 31st August 2025 start balance £23,280.27, end balance £22,065.23; no money in, money out £1,215.24.
- It was agreed to raise the Clerk's salary in line with the national pay award, backdated to April. It was also discussed and agreed that the Clerk could move her salary to a monthly standing order instead of being paid quarterly by cheque.
- It was agreed by all members that Paul Wilson and Andrew Smith would be added as signatories to the bank account; with Michael Watts being removed as he has now retired from the parish council.
- After a cheque for Kirkland Children's Playground was returned from Cumberland Building page 10

- Society, the replacement cheque seems to have been lost in the post, so a third cheque needed to be signed, with the previous two being void.
- **Schedule of Income and Expenditure** were discussed and agreed, there were no cheques signed between meetings, cheques as agreed on the schedule were signed at the meeting.
 - CN 296 £1,296.24 Clerk Salary July to September 2025.
 - o CN 297 £53.70 Home Working Allowance August-September 2025 and postage costs.
 - CN 298 £87.50 Lamplugh with Ennerdale PCC Contact Magazine and Kirkland Mission hire
 - o CN 299 £1,500.00 Kirkland Children's Playground
 - o CN 300 £72.19 Michael Watts, replacement defibrillator pads.
- The accounts were discussed, agreed and signed as a true and accurate record.

Planning- Applications/Decisions

- 4/25/2309/0F1 Demolition of existing garage and replacement with two storey side extension and addition of balcony to rear, Cogra Ghyll, Crossgates, Lamplugh no objections were noted. This application came out after the agenda had been published.
- 4/21/2187/0F1, and 4/21/2188/0F1 Land to South of Whinnah Cottages, Lamplugh. This is still waiting for determination from the Planning Inspectorate, it has now been 84 weeks.

Parish Matters/Business


- A thank you message was received from Michael Watt.
- A thank you message was received regarding the donation for St Michael's toilet block repairs.
- An email was received from CALC regarding Assertation 10. The Clerk advised that ICO membership was now required, so she would set this up. Going forward, the Clerk will also look at putting together an IT policy and check the website is accessible.
- An email was received from Moores with a charge for not sending the accounts by the end of June. After the Clerk proved that the accounts had been put in on time they admitted this was an oversight and issued a credit note for this.
- An email for the Cumberland Local Plan was received, with a poster. It was agreed the poster should be put on the Facebook page and also on the noticeboards.
- A letter was received regarding Code of Conduct letter with a PowerPoint presentation attached, the Clerk went over this with councillors and suggested they watch the slideshow that had been sent.
- An email was received regarding trees which were overhanging carriageways and the possible dangers of this to vehicles. This has been reported to Highways, but it was agreed that the parish council would also report this to Highways.

A Farmer's Observations

Aye, neets are cutten in. Or if you prefer, the days are getting shorter.

Autumn is in full swing, the landscape is changing colour and wildlife and farm animals are busy fattening up for the winter. The valley is probably at its most picturesque at this time of year.

Autumn marks the end of one sheep farming cycle and heralds the start of the next. The fell-going sheep that graze the fells and common land in the parish are preparing for winter alongside the wild creatures that share their grazing. Both wild and farmed animals have enjoyed a fairly pleasant summer.

The lambs and calves have done well. The deer and brown hares have flourished, pinching a bit of grass from the pastures. We have had a lot of leverets on the farm this year, nice to see. The geese have benefited from the fresh grass (a goose eats about as much grass as a Herdwick ewe). I counted 18 goslings following a pair of geese, across one of our fields.

The birds have had a good season, skylarks and wheatears all over the place and the fieldfare arrived the other day to enjoy the autumn berries, another sign of changing seasons. The swallows are lining the electric wires, getting ready to fly south, a long journey to Africa. The young barn owls fledged a while ago and are out and about. Maybe not the best news if you are a field vole!

The other birds are going to stay with us, the sparrows and starlings particularly like the grain we buy in, to help feed the calves while in their winter quarters. It is amazing how quickly our wild friends spot an opportunity. The red squirrels have been known to scuttle off with a cereal nut or two, they are really meant for the cows. How much is an energy bar?

Following a very wet winter, spring 2025 was actually very dry. The ewes were able to lamb in dry but cold conditions and in early summer the grass finally started to grow. The new growth was welcomed by the ewes, allowing them to produce plenty of milk for the new arrivals. The cattle on the lower ground produced their calves and were pleased to get out of their winter sheds for the summer.

We have harvested the new grass growth, to make hay and silage for the cows over the coming winter. The sheep get a little bit of fodder if the winter is bad but most manage ok without. At this time of year, the ewes start to reject the attention of their offspring and the

lambs are already more reliant on grazing than suckling. We give the ewes a hand by weaning the lambs, separating them from their mothers, allowing mum time to build up a bit of condition for the most important time of the sheep farming year.

As I mentioned earlier autumn heralds the start of a new cycle. Having been sheared in July they will be dipped in the coming months, to remove summer's ticks and lice. Later in the year the breeding ewes will be introduced to the tups (rams) and so starts another Lakeland shepherding year. More on that in the next couple of months.

"It's aboot back end coows 'Il soun be cumen in." Or if you prefer, it is almost winter, the cows will soon be in the sheds, to avoid them mashing the grassland, as the land gets wetter (a cow weighs upwards of half a tonne).

Sharing skills, changing lives





Once again we will be supporting Christian Engineers in Development (CED) in provision of rain water harvesting tanks.

To date CED training and funding has enabled 344 tanks to be built, mostly 1,000 litre tanks for single households and 10,000 litre tanks for community buildings, predominately churches but also some church-run schools. It is believed that these tanks have benefitted c.6,800 people in north west Tanzania across seven dioceses with whom CED are working. Benefits include time saved collecting water from wells and better water quality leading to improved health and sanitation.

Funding of a 1,000 litre tank costs £140 (or £112 where gift aided by an individual). Last year donations enabled two tanks to be funded. Hopefully we can do the same or better this year!



Developing Ennerdale & Kinniside's Community Led Plan

A challenge facing the **E&K Parish Council** is having a clear idea what our parishioners might want to see happen in the Parish. As mentioned in previous editions of Contact, E&K PC have initiated a review of our **Community Led Plan**. The information that can be included in our Community Led Plan can guide and influence both the *Cumberland Council* and the *Lake District National Park Authority*. This is why we need to know what residents, businesses and visitors think about future development.

Developing an Emergency Led Plan for Ennerdale & Kinniside

The above planning matters are also linked to the development of our first **Ennerdale & Kinniside Emergency Plan**. This work is started but we need to hear your views about the risks to mitigate for, and the ways you think we can best support in emergencies and increase community resilience.

Provide your feedback by visiting one of our Drop In Sessions

To help us better understand what people think, members of the E&K PC will be holding two **Drop In Sessions** at **The Gather**, one the **6th November 2025** and a second on the **8th November 2025**. Both sessions will be between **1-8pm**, which should provide plenty of time to provide feedback.

More information about these sessions will be posted on the E&K PC website and social media nearer the date. Hopefully you can drop in and let parish councillors and members of the *Emergency Plan Working Group* have a better idea about what you think about the issues and opportunities in the Parish and how we might best look after people and the area in times of an emergency, however that might be defined.

Review of the Cumberland Council Local Plan

This does affect our area because part of it is outside of the National Park; for example, in **Ennerdale**, **Vicarage Lane** and the **housing and land at the northern end of the village** is outside of the National Park.

The new system allows residents to report problems directly from their smartphones or devices while out and about, as well as providing:

- Automated updates on their reports.
- Browser-based forms accessible on computers at home or work.
- Improved data on incidents, including geographical information to help us target 'hot spot' areas.
- Case management including automatic allocation and prioritisation for staff.

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
